F. THE GOOD NEWS

District

- Computers: Kindergarten students are practicing their keyboard skills and typing their first and last names. First grade has started to log into google docs for the first time, and they are doing a great job typing their weekly word lists. Second grade is busy making comparison tables in google docs about famous African Americans. Third graders are working hard on creating a science project for the science fair. Fourth grade students will be helping to make signage, posters, and banners for the Churchill Drama Club production of "Alice in Wonderland." The Fifth grade classes completed a project in 3d paint about alliterations. The Sixth graders are currently doing research and making a website on a topic of their choice!

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Stevenson

- Kindergarten students are celebrating the birthday of one of America's favorite authors, Dr. Seuss! Students are reading many of his books and are doing many fun follow up activities that compliment his stories. A special activity that they participated in, Green Eggs and Ham occurred on his birthday, March 2nd. Adopt a Book will take place on March 27th, which will conclude the month long author study of Dr. Seuss.
- First grade learned all about cleaning their teeth and keeping their teeth healthy when the dentist came for a visit. The dentist even knew a little magic that impressed the first graders; thank you Dr. Masella. The first grade scientists went outside and made observations about the daytime sky and made observations at home about the nighttime sky. They celebrated the birthday of Dr. Seuss by reading his books, writing about them, and having their version of green eggs.
- Second grade began the month of March celebrating Dr. Seuss' birthday. The children listened to Oh, The Places You'll Go and wrote a paragraph about their future. They have been celebrating women's history month by reading and researching special women in history
- Students have been working hard preparing for fourth grade! Third grade students paired up with one another to study severe weather patterns in Science, wrote RST's to discuss and compose a comparative piece on different heritages and cultures around the world and studied Dr. Seuss by reading a book of their choice with a Kindergarten friend. Third graders decorated bookmarks to help their Kindergarten buddy love to read and remind them to always keep reading!

Churchill

- The fourth graders completed a science experiment on the formation of rocks. In addition, they are expanding their knowledge by completing a research project on the rock cycle. In Language Arts, students are working on a novel study and participating in Literature Circles. Each student has a different role to complete each week based on that week's reading. Students finished the multiplication unit in Math, learning a variety of ways to find the product. The fourth graders are continuing their study of NJ and learning about how the European settlers contributed to the formation of our colony.
- The fifth grade Math DI students are building their perseverance by working on Churchill's ST Math. They are extending such diligence into practice in their Math classes.

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- On Friday, February 23, the sixth grade students were fortunate enough to hear the first-hand accounts of two Holocaust survivors via the JCC Metro West of West Orange, New Jersey. Each student was provided with a bracelet that states "Remember and Tell" and the message that they should treat others with kindness.
